

Dynamic Maps: A HUMLab workshop

September 17-18, 2003

This workshop takes as its starting-point both new interactive visualization technologies and traditional representation, maps and cartography. It will take place in a modern information technology space with ample opportunities for testing new technologies and for showing examples as well as informal discussion. In co-operation with BildMuseet, the museum of contemporary art and visual culture, a unique collection of early pictorial representations will be shown. These will serve as a starting-point for a discussion of visual traditions and scientific representation. A key concern is the dynamic nature of representations - both traditional and new. As a matter of fact, the whole lab will be plastered with visual material from the [Images of Thought](#) exhibition and other high-quality map-related exhibitions. After a reception at the museum on the first day, dinner will take place in the old town hall in Umeå.



Participants come from many different disciplines, and among the speakers are people with a background in geography, art history, information visualization, history, computing science and linguistics. There will be three international speakers and about five or six national speakers. Among the speakers are

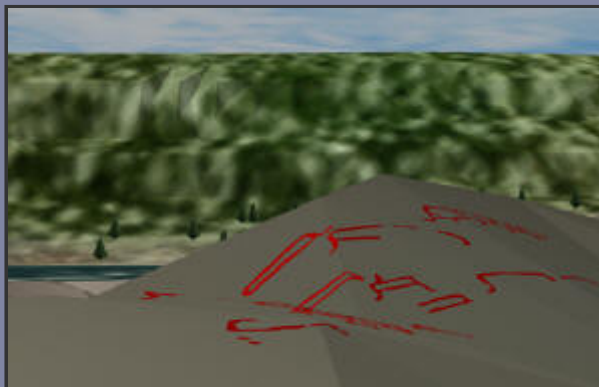
The event is sponsored by the Humanities faculty, Umeå University and the The Bank of Sweden Tercentenary Foundation.



The idea is to encourage an informal dialogue and to allow time for exciting meetings between disciplines, traditions, ideas and people. Apart from the "official" speakers, there will also be about fifteen other participants. Also, there will be a session with an artist who will present and discuss his/her work in relation to maps and cartographic representation. Several interesting projects will be demonstrated, and there will be also be time to discuss project ideas and visions.

HUMLab is a high-profile meeting place between the humanities, culture, art and new technology. It is an open, flexible information technology environment which brings together people from all over the university as well as artists and others. The lab is open to students as well as faculty, and the idea is not to make any difference between different kinds of people, and to encourage interaction, multiple perspectives and many simultaneous activities. HUMLab research focuses on visualization, computer game

studies, virtual environments, virtualization of language, cultural heritage methodology, embodiment and geographical information systems. HUMLab runs a seminar series which attracts a varied and large audience, and recent international seminar speakers include Katherine Hayles, Brenda Laurel, Mark Stephen Meadows and Bonnie DeVarco.

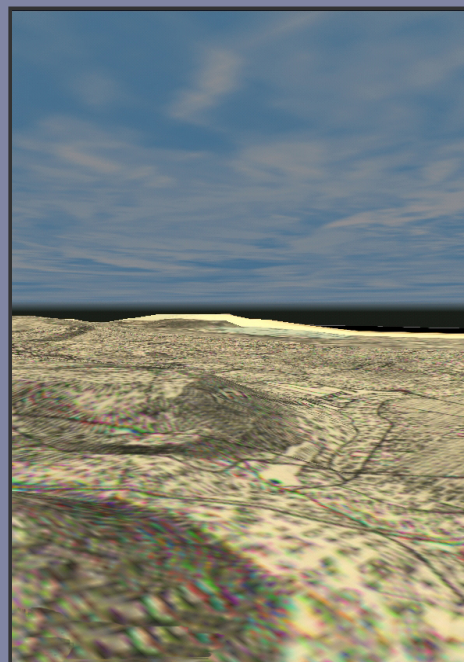
